


Survey Methodology

- o 25 organizations contacted


- o Online Survey

Organizations Represented by Respondents




Geography of Respondents

Provinces







Local Multi-Level Government or Partnerships to Aid Brownfield









Sector Recommendations

The top actions or tools that need to be implemented or strengthened by each sector in order to advance brownfield redevelopment.

Development Sector

- 1. Work in partnership with local governments to find solutions.
 - ✓ Educate,
 - ✓ lobby,
 - ✓ share lessons learned.
- Apply pressure on local governments. Make brownfields a priority.
- 3. Support each other. Experienced developers mentoring smaller property owners.
- 4. Be a source for an inventory. Get creative with brownfields.

Environmental Sector

- Encourage and become comfortable with risk assessment.
 Lobby for new technology.
 Be involved with communication.
 Ensure clarity on regulatory requirements for risk management.
- Better education and training for appropriate Qualified Persons skill sets.
- 3. Better understanding of brownfields; opportunities & benefits.

Legal Sector

- 1. Charge less.

 Be more open for consultation.

 Collaborate with the community more.
- Create guidance documents that outline the barriers to liability closures.
- Create other guidance documents of regulatory process and applicable laws.

Finance & Insurance

- "Educate, educate, educate."
 Understand perceived risk vs. actual risk and how risk management is important and should be welcomed.
- 2. Understand the overall inherent value of brownfields; not just the new building, but the greater societal benefit.

Federation of Canadian Municipalities

- 1. Lobby for and allocate more government funding.
- 2. Increase flexibility of application forms. Increase diversity of projects that qualify for grants.
- 3. Continue spreading the message: "Brownfields are of value!"
- Continue with the education of municipalities, general public, and governments about technical guidance, training, and the value of brownfields.

Academia

- 1. Conduct studies within a reasonable time frame.
- Study Best Management Practices, Lessons Learned, and case studies.
- Researchers collaborate with organizations, companies, and municipalities.
- 4. "Understand there is a significant difference between Theory and Real Life"

Canadian Brownfields Network

- 1. Improve outreach through webinars, conferences, and more local events.
- 2. Partner with ECO Canada, municipal governments, and other associations.
